"I was trying to be positive which is hard on chemotherapy.

"Simon was there every day from 7am, with a portable DVD player and movies.

"He would cook me different meals, because after five months hospital food can get boring.

"His toasted sandwiches were a special treat.

"I thought that I would crumble but you have no choice but to get on with it - I surprised myself," she said.

SINCE his bride-to-be fell ill with leukaemia Simon Hern has been donating blood to Australian Red Cross.

One in three people will need blood in their lifetime, meaning there's a strong chance it could be your husband, wife, boyfriend or girlfriend.

But only one in 30 people donate, which means Australians rely on just 3% of the nation to supply blood for more than 22 million people.

Mackay residents are being urged to roll up their sleeves and give blood this Valentine's Day to help save the lives of loved ones across Australia.

Mr Hern knows all about the importance of donating blood.

When fiancée Natasha Graham was diagnosed with leukaemia the pair put their lives on hold and moved to Brisbane for Ms Graham to receive treatment.

"After seeing someone you love fight for their life, and seeing how blood products can help them get better, it shows you how important donating blood is to saving lives," Mr Hern said.

Ms Graham said 34% of all blood donations went towards helping cancer patients and people with blood disorders.

"Just one donation can help save three lives," she said.

"You can save someone's loved one."

She said even though she could not give blood she appreciated those who gave the gift of life to others.

"When I was in hospital last year, I had about 50 transfusions," she said.

Australia Red Cross blood service community relations officer Pippa Peach said most people would give anything to save the life of their loved one.

"This Valentines Day there's no better gift to give than blood because one day it might be donated blood that helps save the life of your loved one," she said.

"The blood you give will potentially help someone's husband or wife, girlfriend or boyfriend.

"Giving blood only takes an hour of your time and every donation helps save three lives," she said.
